


Monroe County Historical Society

Dr. Fred Zeigler has recently published another book, one that tells the story of our region's colonial era history. 'The Settlement of the Greater Greenbrier Valley, West Virginia' is based on primary documents that reveal the development of roads, farms, mills and other areas of commerce. It also



includes an index of the names of the earliest families and these are organized into nineteen settlement areas in present day Pocahontas, Summers, Monroe and Greenbrier Counties. This wonderful reference work, as well as many other local history publications are on sale at the museum.

building is on-going. In addition to the new porch roof, the leaky main roof has been replaced by Tim Hiner of Diggety Dog Construction.




July Quarterly Meeting
